

A Sampler of Scares

by Elaine Waite, Readers' Advisory and Collection Development Librarian, with summaries from Goodreads.

No matter your tolerance for terror, there's a book for you on this list! The following titles have been sorted from simply spooky to downright distressing.



The Ballad of Perilous Graves by Alex Jennings*

Nola is a city full of wonders. A place of sky trolleys and dead cabs, where haints dance the night away and Wise Women keep the order, and where songs walk, talk and keep the spirit of the city alive. To those from Far Away, Nola might seem strange. To failed magician, Perilous Graves, it's simply home. Then the rhythm stutters. Nine songs of power have escaped from the magical piano that maintains the city's beat and without them, Nola will fail. Unexpectedly, Perry and his sister, Brendy, are tasked with saving the city. But a storm is brewing and the Haint of All Haints is awake. Even if they capture the songs, Nola's time might be coming to an end.



The September House by Carissa Orlando*

After purchasing the beautiful Victorian house on Hawthorne Street at an unexpectedly low price, Margaret and her husband Hal experience overwhelming (and undisclosed) hauntings each September. The walls drip blood, ghost children run through the halls, and the basement door must be boarded up and blessed by a priest lest the thing living down there try to escape. While most would choose to cut their losses and run, Margaret remains, insistent on staying in the only home she's ever truly owned. However, Hal leaves without notice one night, cutting all communication. Their daughter Katherine, unaware of her parents' circumstances, arrives searching for him in the first week of September.




Horrorstör by Grady Hendrix

Something strange is happening at the Orsk furniture superstore in Cleveland, Ohio. Every morning, employees arrive to find broken Kjerring bookshelves, shattered Glans water goblets, and smashed Liripip wardrobes. Sales are down, security cameras reveal nothing, and store managers are panicking. To unravel the mystery, three employees agree to work a nine-hour dusk-till-dawn shift. In the dead of the night, they'll patrol the empty showroom floor, investigate strange sights and sounds, and encounter horrors that defy the imagination.

Adelaide Henry carries an enormous steamer trunk with her wherever she goes. It's locked at all times. Because when the trunk opens, people around Adelaide start to disappear. The year is 1915, and Adelaide is in trouble. Her secret sin killed her parents, forcing her to flee California in a hellfire rush and make her way to Montana as a homesteader. Dragging the trunk with her at every stop, she will become one of the "lone women" taking advantage of the government's offer of free land for those who can tame it—except that Adelaide isn't alone. And the secret she's tried so desperately to lock away might be the only thing that will help her survive the harsh territory.



The Indifferent Stars Above: The Harrowing Saga of a Donner Party Bride by Daniel James Brown*

In April of 1846, twenty-one-year-old Sarah Graves, intent on a better future, set out west from Illinois with her new husband, her parents, and eight siblings. Seven months later, after joining a party of emigrants led by George Donner, they reached the Sierra Nevada Mountains as the first heavy snows of the season closed the pass ahead of them. In early December, starving and desperate, Sarah and fourteen others set out for California on snowshoes and, over the next thirty-two days, endured almost unfathomable hardships and horrors.

Adult Department Director

What drew you to work in libraries?

Ironically, working in libraries was going to be my "temporary job" until I decided what I wanted to be when I grew up. My first job out of college was with the Clermont County Public Library (CCPL) in Ohio and this "temporary job "turned into a 37-year adventure. I worked in a great community and had an opportunity to work with fantastic people.

Can you share a little about your work at Clermont County Public Library and what you enjoyed most about it?

As I mentioned, my entire career in libraries had been spent with CCPL, working eventually in five of the system's ten branches throughout the county. I started in an entry-level position as a circulation clerk progressing to reference services, to librarian, and then to becoming a branch manager. I literally grew up in the system. For the past decade I have served as the assistant director of the CCPL system. During that time, I often had dual roles, sometimes as the human resources director, and other times as the public services manager. The thing I enjoyed the most was the people—those I worked for and those I worked with. I have met so many fantastic and interesting people in my career. The connections and friendships you make are the greatest parts of librarianship.

What most excites you about joining the Glen Ellyn Public Library team?

One of the things I missed most about librarianship was working with the public. In my former position I did not have a lot of time to work at a public desk and interact with people. Coming to Glen Ellyn was an opportunity to get back to what I loved most. I am working with a great team, and I am having fun meeting new people. I am really excited to be here.

Is there a library program or project you've worked on that you're especially proud of?

One project I am especially proud of is the genealogical service CCPL offers to both local, national, and international researchers. When I became the manager of the Doris E. Wood Branch in Batavia, Ohio, I was tasked with making the collection more accessible to the public. The branch housed the local genealogical society's collection, but staff did not feel ownership of the collection. During my tenure at the branch, that changed. All staff of the branch are trained to assist anyone with the collection. Training is now also required of all system staff. The library has assisted researchers from almost every state in the United States as well as researchers from Australia, United Arab Emirates, Germany, and England.

When you're not at the library, how do you like to spend your time?

As a recent transplant from Cincinnati, Ohio, I've been spending time exploring the area. I especially love the shops in Glen Ellyn's downtown as well as going to the local farmers markets on Saturdays. I have new memberships at The Morton Arboretum, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Lincoln Park Zoo, so I've been making use of my memberships. I also like to participate in local 5Ks.

- · use a keyboard to copy and paste
- use a mouse to double-click and left-click, click-and-drag and highlight text, and scroll
- navigate file directories, open and rename files
- use a flash drive
- patience to use a computer for up to an hour




