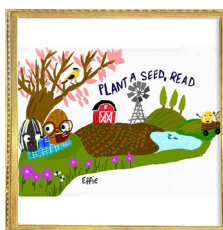
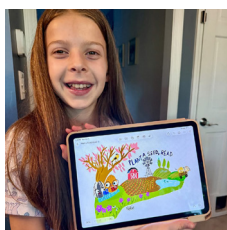
Small Actions, Massive Impact: Sustainability in Everyday Life

When we think of sustainability, our minds often drift to massive wind farms, international climate treaties, or corporate green initiatives. 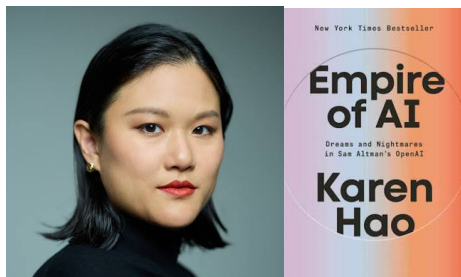

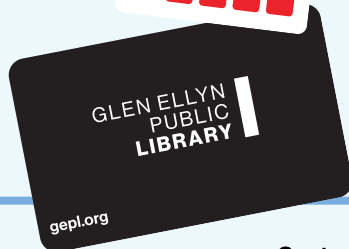

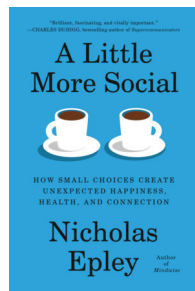

A Little More Social: How Small Choices Create Unexpected Happiness and Connection by Dr. Nicholas Epley

We know that social connection enriches our lives—so why do we hesitate to connect?

Humans are a highly social species uniquely equipped to connect with other people and doing so is better for us. Yet we so often choose to be unsocial. Every day, we avoid opportunities to connect with strangers, neighbors, colleagues, friends, and family. By missing those moments, we miss out on all the benefits of a more social life—one that is happier and healthier for everyone.

University of Chicago psychologist and author of *Mindwise*, Nicholas Epley has spent his career studying the way we connect, and he has found that our social fears often keep us from reaching out. But bridging the gap between two people is easier than we think—and success is more likely than we imagine. We just have to be a little more social.

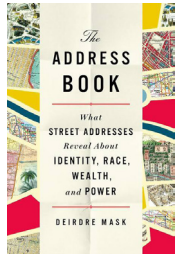

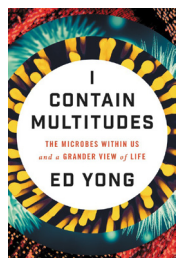

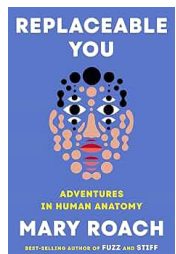
The Address Book by Deirdre Mask*

We also see what not having an address means for millions of people, including those who live in the slums of Kolkata and on the streets of London.



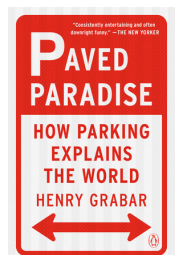
I Contain Multitudes by Ed Yong

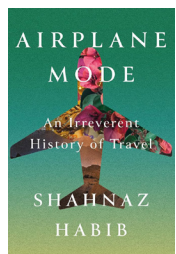
Replaceable You by Mary Roach*

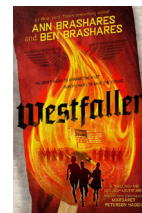

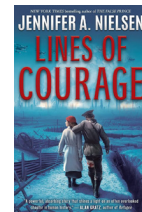
Rebellion 1776 by Laurie Halse Anderson

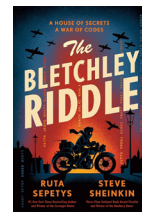
Westfallen by Ann and Ben Brashares

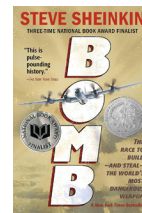
The Bletchley Riddle by Ruta Sepetys, Steve Sheinkin
